2nd NBS lab up for launching

West Visayas State U Med Center gets a nod



The NSC-Visayas located at the West Visayas State University Medical Center, the second Newborn Screening Center in the country.

The Department of Health, through the Bureau of Health Facilities and Services, reviewed the applications for the Newborn Screening Center (NSC) for the Visayas and Mindanao.

WVSUMC topped the five applicants in the bid for the next Newborn Screening Center under the National Comprehensive Newborn Screening Program. The accreditation of the WVSUMC is scheduled in early 2006. This is pursuant to Republic Act 9288 or the Newborn Screening Act of 2004, which states that no NSC shall be allowed to operate unless it has been duly accredited by DOH based on the standards and procedural guidelines approved by the Advisory Committee on Newborn Screening.

The accreditation team will be chaired by Dr. Thomas Maramba (pathologist), Dr. Bradford Therrell (Executive Director, US Newborn Screening and Genetics Resource Center), representatives from the Department of Health and National Institutes of Health. Once accredited, the WVSUMC will house NSC-Visayas and will be responsible for the processing of samples from the Visayas and Mindanao.#

NSC-NIH BULLETIN

1. Notice to All Hospitals and Birthing Facilities:

Compliance with Republic Act No. 9288 (Newborn Screening Act of 2004) and pursuant to Rules and Regulations of Implementing RA 9288:

Sec. 2 ... The National Comprehensive Newborn Screening System shall ensure that every baby born in the Philippines is offered the opportunity to undergo newborn screening and, thus, be spared from heritable conditions that can lead to mental retardation and death, if undetected and untreated.

Sec. 21-a ALL HOSPITALS, BIRTHING FACILITIES, RURAL HEALTH UNITS, HEALTH CENTERS AND OTHER COLLECTING UNITS throughout the country shall have NBS Specimen Collection kits at all times.

Sec. 24 The DOH, through the Bureau of Health Facilities and Services (BHFS), shall include, among others, the provision of NBS services in the licensing requirements for hospitals and birthing facilities.

2005 Year-End Updates

When the Newborn Screening Reference Center started full operations in 2005, we only had one goal—to increase the number of newborns screened in the Philippines. NBS has been in the country for nearly a decade when Republic Act No. 9288 or the Newborn Screening Act of 2004 took effect. Yet despite these developments, the coverage remained low—only about 6% of the newborn population were screened in 2004 and only 366 (21%) of the 1,760 health facilities nationwide offered NBS services.

As an office providing technical support to the Department of Health, we took it as a challenge to help DOH push the numbers higher by increasing newborn screening awareness among the health professionals and the public.

At the close of the year, we made marked achievements in one area: the number of health facilities offering newborn screening more than doubled in 12 months at 760. NSRC achieved this feat in partnership with DOH and its regional offices, as well as other agencies and organizations.—But then again, we are yet to make a dent in the coverage of babies screened: only about 8.5% of the newborn population was screened in 2005.

With the inclusion of NBS services in the DOH licensing requirements for health facilities starting 2006, all hospitals and birthing facilities will, therefore, inevitably offer newborn screening. The new challenge for DOH—and therefore, NSRC—is to push the existing Newborn Screening Facilities to screen all the newborns delivered in their facility and to create a demand for newborn screening services by creating greater public awareness.

We are continually inspired by many NBS advocates—organizations, local governments and individuals-whose exemplary and unwavering commitment to advocate newborn screening among their fellow Filipinos contribute to improving the health of the Filipino children. We enjoin the rest to rise up and commit to the challenge of saving more than 33,000 babies from mental retardation annually. We look forward to the day when all our health practitioners, health administrators, policymakers and parents will become newborn screening advocates. This is our contribution to the future generation.#




Fig. 1. Annual Coverage of Newborns Screened versus Live Birth Population from 1996-2005*




Fig. 2. Number of Newborn Screening Facilities Per Year




Fig. 3. Number of Health Facilities per Category

Sta. Catalina-Bayawan-Basay Inter-Local Health Zone: Pointers to sustaining NBS

Sta. Catalina, Bayawan and Basay municipalities comprise the pioneer district in the Inter-Local Health Zone (ILHZ). It was awarded as the best district health system initiator allover the Philippines. The Sta-Baya-Bas District received more than 75 technical visits from allover the country and even other countries because we were recognized as the top ILHZ—making the devolution of health care service delivery work, including newborn screening service.

When we talk about profitability aspect, there seem to be too many obstacles. But if we talk of service, I think the obstacles can be remedied. We have served so many babies through newborn screening here in Sta-Baya-Bas ILHZ because we don't talk about profit. We are now trying to influence the neighboring municipalities with the same thinking. What I'm doing now is to document the sustainability of the NBS program to come up with a publication which may benefit other local governments and ILHZs.

As far as sustaining the program, we should always have the active participation of the community, genuine local government governance and creative financing scheme.

Active participation of the community.

If we want a program to succeed, we should involve them because they are the source of the problem; and since they are the source, they can also identify the solutions. We act as facilitators in reaching the solutions. Give them the proper information, advantages and the disadvantages—advocacy and promotion.

Genuine LGU governance.

Here in StaBAyabas health zone, the LGU leaders are properly oriented of any program that will enter our system. That's why even before the law was enacted, they were already aware of the NBS program. Here, NBS was implemented in 2000—four years ahead. We are not just able to convince

the LGUs, we have also expanded to the provincial level. We have convinced the Sangguniang Panlalawigan to create an ordinance on the NBS to be implemented in all health facilities. Bayawan District Hospital, as initiator, now acts as the NBS trainer/resource for the province with funding from the community health funds.

Creative financing.

Financing is the most important in ensuring sustainability of a program or project. In the financing aspect, wherever we go, the usual answer is we cannot afford. I say, affordability depends on how you will treat your expenditures. If you spend for the future of a baby—and this is for a lifetime—you invest only P550-P600 now and you are protecting the baby until adulthood and old age.#

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The Newborn Screening Reference Center (NSRC) has taken over the management and publication of this newsletter from the Institute of Human Genetics (IHG), National Institutes of Health (NIH) and the Philippine Newborn Screening Program (PNSP). This is in line with NSRC's role in providing resource and information in the area of newborn screening to benefit the public health community, consumers and government officials of the country.

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
