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Visayas Region Steps Up NBS Staff Capacity

Screening (ENBS) became available to all the newborn screening facilities (NSFs) in the Visayas region. The region then saw a steady increase in the number of NSFs offering ENBS to their clients. As a result, more babies were screened for disorders not previously included in the NBS panel. For many health service

providers, these new disorders are indeed unfamiliar topics with which they have little or probably even no experience.

To address this concern, the Department of Health–Regional Office (DOH-RO) 6, in partnership with the Newborn Screening Center (NSC)-Visayas, the Newborn Screening Continuity Clinic (NBSCC), and the provincial health offices in Region 6, held the first orientation on the clinical management of newborn screening disorders on September 14-16, 2016.


